Waste and recycling survey:

To help combat climate change and recover valuable resources from our waste, the Government has issued local authorities with guidance on how waste and recycling should be collected. Through these recycling reforms (see below for link)), recycling across England will be easier as all local authorities will collect the same materials from every household for recycling.

In Solihull, this will include the provision of a new weekly collection of food waste and a standard set of materials for recycling.

Solihull already collects most of the materials required through our existing recycling services, but in 2026 we will need to introduce a weekly food waste collection service, so it is important that we start to make plans now for how we will deliver this new service in Solihull.

It is vital that we make these changes as they will help us to increase recycling rates and further reduce the amount of waste that is placed in the rubbish bin for disposal (non-recyclable waste).

Most of these changes are compulsory and we need to implement them to comply with Government regulations which have been put in place to deliver England's overall climate action plan.

However, it is important that we understand your thoughts and opinions regarding the changes so we can provide you with the right level of support and information to help you make the changes as easy as possible.

Please help us to get it right by answering the questions in the following survey. It should take around 10 minutes to complete.

Current supporters include the Church of England Birmingham and Warwick District Council - at the moment Coventry, Solihull, Stratford upon Avon and Warwickshire Councils are not listed as supporters.

Take part in more vital citizen science with a Bat Survey.

Bat numbers in the UK have declined dramatically over the last century and there are reports that they are struggling this year as the wet weather means there are fewer insects around for them to eat. We can help to monitor the UK's bats by taking part in surveys. By monitoring bats we can discover how they are faring and the factors that are important for their survival. The National Bat Monitoring Programme has been running since 1996. It gives us, and government, the information needed to help inform bat conservation.

It's really easy to get started. Find out how to do your first bat count or make good use of previous experience. You need to be 16 or over to sign up to take part.
